REACH taught Dr. Buccino how to treat Hollis's ADHD.

"Getting Hollis to do his homework used to be like World War III," says his mother, Elisabeth Charpentier. "He would scream, throw chairs, slam doors. But now he just comes in, takes off his backpack, and starts right to work."

Hollis is a bright, athletic kid with a wicked sense of humor. But, beginning in kindergarten, he struggled with behavioral issues. "Every day, I'd get a call from school," Elisabeth says. "Sometimes I'd have to pick him up because he had done something violent."

Elisabeth consulted Hollis's pediatrician, Deborah Buccino, MD. Using her REACH training, Dr. Buccino worked with Elisabeth and Hollis on coping strategies.

"REACH training let me be comfortable listening rather than feeling the need to have all the answers," said Dr. Buccino. The training also equipped her to prescribe medications proven to be effective in treating ADHD.

Dr. Buccino prescribed a standard stimulant for ADHD. The result was a focused kid who did his homework and earned good grades. Elisabeth stopped getting calls from school. Hollis's self-esteem improved, and other children started inviting him to birthday parties.

"I feel like the weight of the world has been lifted off my shoulders," said Elisabeth.

Every REACH-trained primary care provider can tell many stories like this one. Your support enables training that in turn enables clinicians to improve patients' mental health and relieve caregivers' stress.

Primary care and other providers learn evidencebased strategies to diagnose and treat mental health conditions in children and teens. Once trained, each clinician changes the trajectories of dozens or hundreds of patients every year.

Scholarships target primary care providers serving low-income rural and urban communities, where few families have access to mental health care.

CBT for Anxiety in Primary Care teaches primary care providers cognitive-based therapy skills to help patients cope with anxiety.

- Coping with grief
- Supporting LGBTQIA+ youth


FREE TRAINING!

- In 2021, we planned to launch opportunities for free training in high-need locations:
- Our first Pediatric Mental Health Training Award to enable federally qualified health
- centers serving low-income communities to offer free training to their providers
- Scholarships for pediatric primary care providers in greater Atlanta, funded by an anonymous donor
